

When to check bait stations

Rats and mice will begin consuming the bait on the first day, making it important to check bait stations every few days. Those stations with evidence of heavy feeding will need to be replenished. If a bait station shows no rodent activity, move it to a new location.

Duration of Clout usage

Continue to bait with Clout blocks even after evidence of feeding has stopped, especially in areas that have shown the greatest rodent activity. Replenish Clout blocks regularly to maintain rodent control.

Clout packaging

Clout All Weather Bait is available in pails of 200 blocks. Each block is 0.5 oz.

Handling bait blocks

Some rodenticide researchers recommend using gloves when baiting to reduce the human smell imparted to the bait block.

Wash hands with soap and water after handling and before eating or smoking.

Most rat baits are anticoagulants. While this type of rodenticide might work, the unique formulation of Clout® (bromethalin), a neurotoxin, offers a few distinct advantages over other baits:

1. Clout kills rodents every time.

Have you ever used an anticoagulant-based rodenticide only to notice that the rodents come back or, even worse, didn't go away to begin with? This is because large populations of rats and mice have grown resistant to these poisons. But Clout, with its active ingredient, bromethalin, has been proven to kill rodents every time—even ones that have become resistant to other poisons.

2. Clout is the most palatable carrier in the U.S.

Rodents won't die if they don't consume the bait. Isn't it nice to know that you're using the most palatable rodenticide in the country?

3. Clout has a stop-feed action, so rodents consume up to 400% less bait.

Clout contains an appetite suppressant, so rodents will not continue to feed after they've "taken the bait." Less rodent feeding = less time filling traps, and less money.

4. Clout kills fast.

Two to three days fast. Plus, rodents stop eating after their first feeding. Compare this to most rodenticides, where rodents stay alive and consume bait for 5 to 10 days.

Mode of action

Bromethalin is a neurotoxin. Physiological and biochemical experiments suggest that the active ingredient, bromethalin, uncouples energy metabolism in the central nervous system, yielding a decrease in nerve impulse conduction, paralysis and death.

Where and how to place Clout

First, take caution to protect yourself, pets and livestock from accidental ingestion, as you would with any poison. Wear gloves to keep your scent off the bait as well as to keep the active ingredient off of you should it become exposed. Place blocks away from heavily traveled human traffic areas.

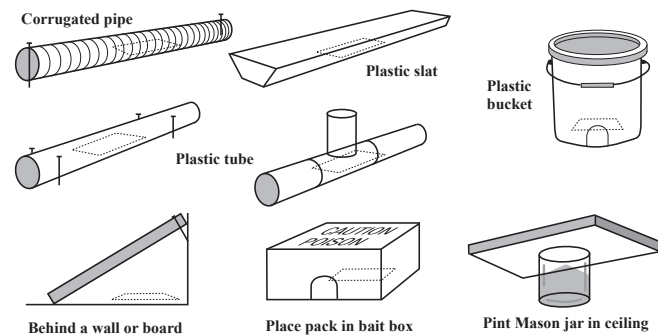
Look for areas showing fresh signs of rodent activity: burrows, gnawings and fresh droppings. Rats don't generally stray far from food and water resources.

Place Clout bait blocks in the recommended areas. For rats, place 2 to 12 bait blocks 20 to 30 feet apart. Place 1 block every 8 to 12 feet for mice.

Blocks, placed along rat and mouse passageways, near gnawed openings in buildings, or near food sources (but out of reach of children, nontargeted species, pets and livestock) will be most effective.

Other ways to place blocks include inside a secured pipe, behind a wall or board, or in a plastic bucket. See the illustrations for other suggestions on how to assure that only rats and mice eat Clout.

Blocks can be fastened with a nail on rafters, ceilings, etc.

*Out of reach of children, pets, domestic animals or wildlife. Otherwise, use tamper-resistant bait stations.
